CHAMPIONSHIP PLANNING UNDERWAY

Plans for organizing the 1981 U.S. Orienteering Championships have gotten off the ground. At a meeting on January 12th, Pat Quinlan, the President of the BOC, announced that he had divided the project into approximately twelve areas of responsibility. Since that meeting, he's contacted certain club members asking them to be in charge of the twelve tasks. Each coordinator will have a pool of club members to draw from to organize his or her area.

The meet is set for the 24th and 25th of October. The first day's competition will be held at Camp Schoellkopf in Wyoming County. Day 2 will be at the Sardinia Forest. Upwards of 500 competitors from U.S.A. and Canada are expected to participate.

Map production for the two areas is reported to be underway. A Scandinavian firm has the aerial photographs for Schoellkopf. The photos for Sardinia should be sent soon. Ted de St.Croix has been retained to do the fieldwork and the final drawing. Ted is one of the most experienced orienteers and mappers in North America. He has also agreed to design the courses.

Harry Stroman of the BOC is coordinating the search for a headquarters and accompodations center for the meet. He's been talking with Camp Beaver Meadows and Camp Aloha about their facilities. Both camps appear interested in helping out.

Although no banquet is planned for the Saturday night, it will still be a challenge finding cabins, motels, and tent space for the competitors. A party and get-together is planned instead of a formal banquet.

Quinlan also announced that he was going to encourage the twelve coordinators to attend the "A" meet in Hamilton,Ontario which is scheduled for the first weekend in May. This will give them a chance to observe the procedures used at the start, finish, etc.

More details are expected to be announced at the Annual General Meeting on March 20.

Now that the snow has melted, our thoughts are turning to spring and of course to the upcoming orienteering season. Plans are already underway for our two local meets this spring. THE CONSTITUTION

Here's the constitution of the club. We're printing it here in case anyone wants to propose changing it at the Annual General Meeting on March 20.

- 1. NAME AND PURPOSE. The club shall be called the BUFFALO ORIENTEERING CLUB. The purpose of the club shall be to encourage and promote the sport of Orienteering.
- 2. MANAGEMENT. a. The affairs of the club shall be conducted by an Executive Committee which shall consist of a President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. The Executive Committee shall meet and act as required for the efficient conduct of the Club's business. A
 - quorum shall consist of two members.
 b. The members of the Executive Committee are to be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting to be help prior to March 31 each year.
 - c. The President shall preside at meetings of the Executive Committee and the Club.
 - d. The Secretary shall record the business of all meetings and be responsible for the club's publicity.
 - e. The Treasurer shall handle and record all financial transactions of the Club, and shall keep an accurate record of the members.
- 3. AFFILIATIONS. The Club shall be a member of the United States Orienteering Federation
- 4. AMENDMENTS. These by-laws may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the membership
- at the Annual General Meeting or at any business meeting of the Club.
- 5. MEMBERSHIP. Memberships shall be for the period of January 1 to December 31. Dues shall be set by the Executive Committee subject to the approval of the membership at the Annual General Meeting.

First start at 1:00 PM.


COURSES & CLASSES: Three courses (white, yellow, orange) ranging from 2 km to 5 km. Classes for all ages and both sexes.

CLOSE FINISH HIGHLIGHTS SKI MEET

At BOC's ski-O meet on February 8th, only five seconds separated the top two finishers in the Men's Elite category. Douglas Hollowell of Connecticut finished in 64:05 to edge out Gunnar Larsson of Sweden who had 64:10. Tom Hollowell, Jr., Doug's brother, finished third with a time of 71:15. The meet attracted thirty participants.

The temperature hovered around 30 degrees and it snowed lightly throughout the afternoon. Meet Director Pat Quinlan had designed four courses ranging in distance from 1.9 km for White to 11.1 km for Blue. The Blue and Red courses required a map exchange halfway through. Tracks varied from good to non-existent. The Erie County Parks, Recreation and Forestry Department were cooperative beyond the call of duty. In addition to keeping the wood stove supplied with fuel, they also shooed away snow-mobilers. A group of students from St.Bonaventure University provided a bit of drama when one of their number was late in returning from the forest. A hastily arranged search party found him in good shape not far from the finish.

Some of the participants traveled considerable distances to compete. The Hollowells (Thomas, Barbara, Thomas Jr., Douglas, and Prescott) came all the way from Connecticut to represent the New England Orienteering Club. Barb Sleight brought a small contingent from Syracuse. Rick Worner and Linda Kohn were there from Rochester. And then there was Gunnar. A quick check of the globe showed he was about 4,000 miles from his home in Fjärdhundra, Sweden. He was on a mapping expedition to the United States and managed to take time out to participate. Right after the meet he left for California where he was to meet up with Ted de St.Croix and Per Sandberg. The threesome had mapping projects in San Francisco and San Diego. Not a bad winter "vacation".

Other than a late start, the only major organizational snafu developed when the Meet Director had one of the late starters collect a few of the more distant control markers. Although he started late, he skied fast. You can guess the rest. He managed to remove markers from the Blue and Orange courses before some of the competitors got to them. This caused a little confusion in the forest.

Quinlan was assisted on the organizational side by Harry Stroman (who stood outside all day), Laurel and Olen Ruch, and David Cady.
