MEET INFO: U.S. CHAMPIONSHIPS

DATE: October 24 & 25, 1981

FORMAT: This is a two-day total time USOF sanctioned class "A" meet open to everyone. The results of this meet will determine the 1981 U.S. Orienteering Champions.

LOCATIONS: The day one meet site is at Boy Scout Camp Schoellkopf in the Town of Bennington in Wyoming County. The day two meet site is the Sardinia Forest in the Town of Sardinia in Erie County. (Travel directions below)

MAPS: The maps are 1:15,000, 5-color, and three meter contours. They were drawn in 1981 by Ted de St. Croix from Bakken and Helgesen base maps. Ted is also the course setter.

COURSES: Orange through blue courses will have IOF symbolic control descriptions only. Yellow & White courses will have control descriptions in English as well as in IOF symbols.

(Category designations are composed of a letter, a series of numbers, and another letter. The first letter designates sex: D=females, H=males. The numbers designate age as of December 31, 1981. The dash means the class is open in the direction of the dash; i.e., H-14 is open to males 14 and younger. The last letter indicates the experience level. "A" designates advanced, "B" less advanced, etc. "N" is the novice category. Wayfarers are persons who participate non-competitively. "Open" means people of any age can enter.)

TEAM COMPETITION: Teams will consist of 4 competitors, any combination of males and females, with one Blue, one Red, one Green, and one Orange. The total of their four times both days will determine the champions. All teams must be preregistered by their captains who should send a list of names and courses to the registrar by October 15th. No team entries will be accepted after this date. There is no team entry fee.

FEES: Entry fees are not refundable. In accordance with USOF rules, a surcharge of \$1 per day will be collected from all persons who are not members of USOF, COF, or IOF, except for people entered on the White course.

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT


With the approach of the fall 0-season, our minds should be returning to thoughts of outings in the woods with maps and compasses in search of those elusive controls.

PARTICIPANTS NEEDED FOR REHEARSAL MEET

Participants are needed for the "Rehearsal Meet" on Saturday, October 10. At this meet the procedures for the start and finish areas at the Championships will be tested. White and Yellow courses will be set and anyone not working the start or finish areas is encouraged to come out and run one of the courses.

As a special offer, there will be no charge to compete. That's right, it's absolutely FREE.

Registration starts at 9:30 a.m. with Novice instruction at 10:00 a.m. The first start will be at 11:00 a.m.

The meet will be held at the Sardinia Forest on Genesee Road between Rt.219 and Rt.16. That's in the town of Sardinia in southeast Erie County.

The old black and white Sardinia Forest map will be used (scale 1:15,000).

This meet is an excellent opportunity for anyone interested in orienteering to give the sport a try. If any more information is needed, call Pat Ouinlan at 692-7592.
