# B.O.C. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

## WHO WOULD DO WHAT AT O' MEETS

(Ed. note: The Cleveland O' Club has formalized job descriptions for workers at their O' meets. A proposal will be considered at our Annual Meeting for the B.O.C. to do the same. As a starting point for the discussion, this article reprints the Cleveland job descriptions with a few modifications.)

The MEET DIRECTOR...recruits other workers...sees that complete information on the meet is given to the newsletter editor and the publicist...obtains permission to use the meet site...checks facilities at the meet site such as water, parking, restrooms, etc...sets out direction signs to the meet site...sets up the site itself...answers newcomer's questions...is responsible for first aid (or delegates this)...times finishers or arranges for others to time finishers...supervises posting of results and presentation of awards...sees that the meet site is left in good condition...writes a short report including complete results for the newsletter.

The COURSE SETTER...designs courses and gets them OK'd by the Meet Director three weeks before the meet...checks the courses in the field and marks the points with streamers two weeks before the meet...has the master maps, clue sheets, and master punch card ready one week before the meet...sets the points out the afternoon before or on the morning of the meet (may recruit others to help with this)... organizes the pick-up of points.

The INSTRUCTOR...stands by to brief newcomers on meet procedures, how to orient and read the map, and how to assemble map, clues, and punchcard in map case...answers questions...stands by at master map area in case novices need help...can run in meet.

The REGISTRAR...collects money, hands out map, mapcase, clues, punch card...refers questions to Meet Director or Instructor...can

The STARTER...assigns start times...collects stubs...starts participants...can run in meet (as the last starter).

It may be that during the discussion we discover that there is a need to specify more than the four jobs above. For example, we might decide we need finish line personnel or vetters. Pring your thoughts to the meeting on February 15th.
