WHAT IT IS

Orienteering is a sport based on the ability to navigate through a beautiful forest by using a very accurate map and a compass. Participants must locate a number of markers whose positions are shown

on the map.

"Anyone can orienteer. You start out on very short courses - not longer than around the block a few times. The beginner's course is very simple - all on trails; it's impossible to get lost. You can go in groups. Your family can go together. You really don't even need a compass. The maps are very

good - almost like a picture of the ground.

"Most people don't run, they walk, they stop to look at their map, they walk again. Only the hotshots run - and the ones who wish they were - but they run a lot in the wrong direction. They'd be better off if they walked

"You go strictly at your own pace. With time you will learn to be confident of your mapreading. It's a real source of accomplishment."

The Ski-O meet at the Empire State Winter Games will take place on Sunday, March 3 in Lake Placid.
Entrants do not have to reside in New York State

but in order to qualify they must participate in at least two qualifying meets. Furthermore, they must feast two qualifying meets, rurtnermore, they must finish inthe top 40 (for open divisions) or top 20 (for scholastic divisions) of all the finishers in all the qualifying meets across the state. A "magic formula" is being used to rank competitors who compete in different qualifying meets under different condi-
