## ORIENTEERING AT THE WORLD MASTERS GAMES

I usually do not do much summer orienteering, but a large international meet was being held in the Toronto area and I felt it might be fun to go.

The orienteering competition was very well organized with good courses and good maps. The winners in every age group (from 35 to 60 in blocks of 5 years) were elite racers but maybe not the best in the world --though most were better than me. The M35 courses were long each day - about 8.5 km and we usually started at 11:00 a.m. with high humidity and a temperature of about 85.

The first two days were time trials. Half the runners in an age group qualified for the "A" group for the final day while the slower half were in the "B" group and out of medal contention. Needless to say, I made the "B" group. In fact, no U.S.A. orienteers were in the "A" group in M35 (mostly because no elite M35 U.S.A. runners were there).

The Masters Games had a festive opening ceremony that I went to but for the most part, it was unorganized and very dull. Most of the events were widely separated as were the competitors. You didn't have a lot of contact with other sports' competitors or even with the other orienteers who seemed to disappear after each day's race. To me, overall the Games were a big disappointment even though the actual orienteering events were outstanding.

The most interesting thing I saw were the Japanese women who raced through the woods in full-cover outfits which included small boy scout neckerchief-type scarves and white gloves (in 85 degree weather!).

#### WHISTLES AVAILABLE

The B.O.C. now has a limited number of whistles for sale. They will be available at all club meets. While the final price hasn't been set, it is expected to be about \$1.50.

A whistle can be an important piece of safety equipment while in the woods. At meets in Canada every orienteer is required to carry one. At meets in the U.S. it is up to the discretion of the organizer whether to require them or not.

At the present time, whistles are not mandatory for B.O.C. events. They are highly recommended, however.

# WORLD CUP COMES TO NORTH AMERICA

Next year will be the first year for an officially sanctioned "World Cup" competition in Orienteering. Eight meets will be held, one each in Norway, U.S.A., Canada, France, Sweden, Czeckoslovakia, Hungary, and Switzerland.

Each member country of the International Orienteering Federation will pick eight men and eight women to take part.

The World Cup meet in Canada will take place on May 17 and will be organized by the Hamilton Kings Foresters. The U.S.A. meet follows one week later on the 24th. It will be organized by the Hudson Valley Club at Clarence Fahnestock State Park. Each meet will take place in conjunction with a 2-day "A" Meet which will be open to all.

The Hamilton meet will be a fine opportunity for B.O.C.er's to see the world's finest orienteers in action. The time schedule will most likely be arranged so that you can both participate and spectate.

We'll have more information on World Cup activities as it becomes available.
