Commentary: BAD WEATHER AND GOOD WEATHER

The weather gives orienteering an added dimension. Although many amateur sports take place in spite of the weather, there aren't many in which the participants are all alone in the woods at the time. Most experienced orienteers have come to grips with the weather's diversity and have adapted to it. They've learned how to dress for forty degrees and rain and they know the difference between traversing a wet rocky hillside and a dry rocky hillside. Some may even relish "bad" weather in the hopes that it will unnerve their opposition. Orienteering is a sport which puts you into an intimate relationship with the forest environment and the weather is as much a part of that environment as the rocks and the hills.

For most people who live in the city or the suburbs, the forest is an alien place. Those of us who are orienteers have discovered that we can have fun in what for many people is a scary and forbidding locale. This discovery liberates us from a fear that most people are burdened with. Our experience with the weather provides us with another kind of liberation. As we've come to accept its variety in our sport, many of us have come to accept it in our daily lives as well. Much of the population labors under the impression that on the one hand there is "good" weather and on the other there is "bad" weather. They are happy when the weather is good and sad when it is not. Rainy weather, especially, is seen as a monumental inconvenience. A cloudy day is a gloomy day. Of all the things that exist in our lives to make us sad, we certainly don't need to include something as pervasive as the weather. Orienteers who extrapolate from their experience in the woods see changes in the weather as something to be adapted to, not something to get depressed about. One kind of weather requires a particular set of clothing and equipment and a different kind requires a different set.

So the next time you hear someone complaining about the weather, take them orienteering. It could prove to be a liberating experience for them.

MEET REPORT - 1988 ESG SKI-O QUALIFIER + 1/17/88

Fifty-eight skiers assembled at Three Valley Campground near Buffalo, New York for the 2nd ESG 1988 Ski-O qualifier. With the temperature approaching 50° , the competitors were amazed at how much snow was at the site. The whole area was ski-able on 2 - 4 inches of wet packed snow. Pat & Lucy Quinlan organized assisted by Mark & Phil Wolfling.

Competition was especially tight in the Men's Open Division with Canadian team member Ron Lowry just edging out U.S. team member Mike Kohlhas by 23 seconds. Denise Demonte of Canada won the Women's Open Division by a wide margin but the next three finishers were only separated by 43 seconds.

This race marked the twelfth consecutive year for Ski-O organized by the Buffalo Orienteering Club. The race has never been cancelled. 1980 was the poorest snow year while 1979 had the most. The 1985 race was postponed due to bad weather which closed the Thruway and prevented the racers from getting to the site. Over the past twelve years, the race has been alternated between four sites —— reported by Pat Quinlan
