MAP HIKE NEWS Trouble at the Casino

Map Hike '89 kits for Chestnut Ridge Park are no longer available at the Park Casino. This unfortunate development was the result of a deterioration in the relationship between the club and the operator of the snack bar at the casino. The snack bar is not run by the County Parks Department but is rented out to a concessionaire. Maps for both Chestnut Ridge Park and Sardinia Forest are still available by mail order directly from the club.

The problem with the snack bar operator developed when an employee apparently absconded with receipts from the sale of 26 kits. The snack bar operator felt that the club should attempt to collect directly from the employee who by then was no longer employed by the snack bar. The club's position was that our relationship was with the operator and that he was responsible for paying us the money that was due. He finally agreed to pay up but said he no longer would sell our map hike kits. The only option he gave us was that he would continue to sell the kits if we would take the

In fact he still has not paid the money he owes us. He would only give our treasurer, Dave Staszak, \$10 and insisted that we bill him for the balance.

A map hike is a semipermanent orienteering course. Durable markers are put up in a park or forest and left there for the season, in this case from April 22 until November 19.

HUNTER'S CREEK PARK TO BE MAPPED

Volunteers Needed

The B.O.C. Board of Directors has decided to map Hunter's Creek Park. A survey team of Mark and Phil Wolfling and Greg Hyatt are very embusiastic about the terrain in the park, it's a little wild and more suited for orienteers who have had some experience but a network of ski trails should provide adequate opportunities for novices also. The area is big, 759 acres, and suitable for both foot and Ski-O. The only thing it doesn't have is shelters and toilets and civilized things like that. But those were not seen as insurmountable difficulties for people like orienteers.

As this mapping program gets underway, volunteers will be needed for field checking and drafting. If you think you might like to get involved, please call Phil Wolfling at 937-9300. Don't worry if you lack experience; the skills are easily picked up as long as you have a reasonable amount of orienteering experience. Graphic arts experience also helps but isn't necessary. If you have time to make some phone calls and run some errands we can use your help also.

If you want to have an advance look at the area it's located about 3-1/2 miles E.S.E. of the village of East Aurora. It's bounded on the south by Center Line Road and on the east by Hunter's Creek Road. Access is from two parking lots: one at the south end at the junction of Center Line Road and Vermont Hill Road and the other on the east approximately 500 meters south of the intersection of Hunter's Creek Road and Route 78.

MAP HIKE

Maps with control locations marked on them are distributed. Participants can take as much time as they wish (and whenever they wish) in order to locate the controls.

Once again a drawing for prizes will held. Control cards with at least 10 control codes on them will be entered in a drawing for a compass, T-shirts and embroidered patches. Participants who mail back cards filled in completely will also receive a certificate suitable for framing.
