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Troll Cup/ **USOF Convention '90**

I was getting antsy. I hadn't orienteered for a couple of weeks and I was truly agonizing over the prospect of a long "meet-less" summer. With this in mind, I made the decision to trek to the two day Troll Cup in Connecticut. The Cup generally closes out the spring orienteering season and so predictably the turnout is good.

Located in the beautiful (and big) hills of Macedonia State Park in western Conn., this years Troll Cup was run in conjunction with the USOF's Annual Convention. The convention was held at the Kent Private School for Girls, a perfect venue located directly adjacent to the Troll Cup map and a permanent Trim-O map. The convention consists of 3 days of seminars on everything from computer map making to orienteering psychology and concluded with the USOF Annual General meeting on the final day. Although I was unable to attend the seminars (next year for sure), I heard reports that they were successful with discussions, activities and festivities carrying on 'til all hours. I was able to take part in the Annual Gereral meeting. Being the lone attendee from Buffalo, I was the purveyor of BUOC's 26 votes at the meeting. Much of the meeting was standard fare with budget talks and elections of new board members. Two of the main topics for discussion were the promotion of orienteering and the tentatively scheduled World O' Championships (WOC) to be held in the U.S. in 1993. What surprised me was that some delegates are against promoting orienteering. fearing that it may become as

popular as O' is in Scandanavia. Others were against holding the WOC in '93, reasons such as not being able to pull it off and depleting our resources. Obviously, the discussions were interesting.

As for the Troll Cup itself, the orienteering was both technical and physically demanding. What makes the Cup interesting is that the second day is a chase start. Your start time for the second day is the difference between your time and the winners time from the first day. Thus the first finisher on the second day is the overall winner. The terrain was very similar to West Point with many rock features and the added bonus of the "dreaded" charcoal pit. No these are not small hibachi stands or firepits as I first thought. Around the turn of the century, the Kent area woods were used to fuel the steel mills. To produce the charcoal needed for the coke ovens, the felled trees were burned in pits which created small flat knolls throughout the regrown woods. These charcoal pits were indistinct and could not be relied on for attack points. Some of the orienteers were renaming the charcoal pit controls as "control in middle of woods" or "control on hillside". Precision compass was the best method for locating these controls.

Both the convention and the Troll Cup were superbly organized by the Western Connecticut O' Club and the New England O' Club. Even the weather was well coordinated for the weekend, sunny and warm. Next year let's get a larger Buffalo contingent to join in the convention festivities!
